In the Undergraduate Research Fellows program for the 2013-2014 academic year. The students will each be paid a \$1,000 stipend while they are conducting the research. This is a program in which only 100 students are accepted on an annual basis.

Enactus won a Regional Trophy in Seattle, WA in April 2013 for their Annual Report and outreach programs which helped people in need by utilizing business practices. The group worked with more than 20 local bankers, realtors, and business owners to create a sense of "realistic entrepreneurial pressure" for all participants. They collaborated with two Economic Development Directors in Kansas to expand New Venture Adventure in the Midwest. They created a new venture in a fictional town through the development of mission statements, loan requests, lease negotiation, creation of marketing campaigns, addressing ethical dilemmas, solving global sourcing issues, managing cash flow, and they ultimately made a presentation of their

overall business plan to a panel of judges. In addition, they worked on a campuswide recycling project and developed a program with the UNK Financial Aid office to engage students entering the workforce to learn business terms and concepts. They also worked with area students in the development and opening of the Circle C Market that serves citizens in Cody, Davenport and Potter, NE by providing them with a grocery store and developing entrepreneurial skills within the community. Student Research Day participant **Charla Peeks** from Kearney is in the Family Studies program. She was advised by Dr. Jeanne Stolzer in her research titled "Boys Will Be Boys: The Possibility of Misdiagnosing Biological Behavior." This research challenges the current trend in over diagnosing and misdiagnosing Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) in boys from ages 6-12 years of age that are treated with dangerous stimulant drugs. Behavioral differences in boys and girls were compared to illuminate biological gender differences, illustrating why boys are prone

to being labeled ADHD. Stimulant medications were compared and shown to be analogous with Schedule II drugs such as Methamphetamine, Cocaine and Barbiturates. The long term effects of stimulant drugs on the brain were discussed and explained illustrating the dangerous effects they pose to the brain. Alternatives such as diet, physical activities, and learning environment were discussed as other options to examine before drugging boys.
